Dr. Mark Warshawsky is Deputy Commissioner for Retirement and Disability Policy at the Social Security Administration where he leads policy development and research activities.

He was a Senior Research Fellow at the Mercatus Center of George Mason University from 2014 to 2017. He was director of retirement research at Towers Watson, a global human capital consulting firm, from 2006 to 2013.

Dr. Warshawsky was a member of the Social Security Advisory Board from 2006 through 2012 and was vice chairman of the federal Commission on Long-Term Care in 2013. He served as assistant secretary for economic policy at the U.S. Department of the Treasury from 2004 to 2006, playing a key role in the development of the Pension Protection Act of 2006. He was developer of planning software and an app for personalized retirement income strategies. He has held senior-level positions at the Federal Reserve Board, the IRS, and TIAA-CREF.

Mark is the author of over 150 published articles and four books, including as co-author of the *Fundamentals of Private Pensions*, Ninth Edition (Oxford University Press, 2010) and author of *Retirement Income: Risks and Strategies* (MIT Press, 2012).

He received a B.A. with highest distinction from Northwestern University, and a Ph.D. in economics from Harvard University.
